Introduction

As we start the month of May, we continue to be in the season of Easter. However, pay attention because you will notice a change in our season & liturgical color later this month! During this month we will hear amazing stories that show us yet again how much Jesus loves ALL people! Later in the month we will hear the story of Ascension and Pentecost. Please note that we will not have a Good Shepherd lesson or Sunday school on Sunday, May 30th – enjoy Memorial Day weekend with your family and join us for in-person or virtual church – 9:00 & 11:00 am services available!

This curriculum helps our children continue to grow cognitively, emotionally, and spiritually in their relationship with God. Your job as the parent/guardian is to facilitate your child(ren) through this lesson. Enjoy watching & listening to the story all together, talk through the wondering questions (try your best to not answer these questions - let your child(ren) truly wonder), and help guide them through the activity they choose for the day. Not answering the wondering questions might be the most challenging part of this curriculum, but that is how we help them grow. Here is what's included in this lesson:

What's Going On

The Good Shepherd children's curriculum has a section called "Teacher Helps". This section will help give you our parent/guardians a deeper background to today's story.

Teacher Helps (written by Rev. Brenda Stobbe)

The disciples believed they were helping Jesus. They believed that in keeping these troublesome children out of the way they were allowing their master time and energy for important works, important people. How they misunderstood!

Part of Jesus' ministry that was difficult for his followers to understand was Jesus' unusual desire to care for the powerless. This is exhibited as Jesus ate with tax collectors, talked with prostitutes and touched the untouchable lepers. Jesus loved the children. The scriptures tell us that Jesus became angry with his disciples when they tried to keep the children away. Instead, Jesus made examples of the children, reminding his disciples that to such belong the kingdom of God. The disciples were told that they must come like children, seeking his blessing, to enter the kingdom.

This story is very powerful for children. We need to remember that children are basically powerless. That is, legally at least, less so today than it was in Jesus' day. And yet it's not completely different. Even today a child's wages are legally his parent's until the age of 18 and in some states 21. In the traditions of the Old Testament children were the property of their father. He could sell them if he wished, as slaves, or even have disobedient children put to death. (The Lion Encyclopedia of the Bible, Pat Alexander, Batavia: Lion Publishing, 1986, p. 163)

In this story Jesus took those with no power and made them the models for those who would have the greatest reward, a place in God's kingdom. The kingdom will belong to those who come to God like children, open and trusting.

This story says that children were and are important to God. This is the time when the adults are not the models the children are to follow, but rather the children are the ones the adults are to fashion themselves after.

The wondering questions begin by considering if the children were afraid of the disciples. Let the children answer this. Some may rely on the fact that the parents were with their children so they wouldn't be really afraid, while others may feel that the children were scared of the disciples.

We imagine Jesus' voice being kind and gentle in most cases. But here it says that "when Jesus saw it (the children being rebuked), he was indignant." How would Jesus sound if he was indignant, or angry? It's important to children, and adults, to allow a full range of emotions to belong to Jesus. Anger is not bad, even for, or maybe especially for, Jesus. This anger was beneficial for the children and most children will sense the difference between just anger and irrational anger.

The final question is a very different wondering. As we wonder what it would be like to be held in Jesus' arms, we go far away from anger and very close to peace and security. Jesus didn't just talk to the children. He didn't bless them only with words, but with his touch as well. We try to carry this out as we bless each of the children as they leave the room.

This story is included because it speaks on two levels. To children it will say, "There is a special place for me in Jesus' heart and kingdom." To adults it will say, "God's love is a radical inversion of power with much being given to the otherwise powerless." Hopefully, the child we teach, will understand both when he/she becomes an adult.

You may have noticed that we do not capitalize "kingdom" when referring to the "kingdom of God". This is intentional. It's very easy for adults and therefore easier for children to concretize the "kingdom" as a geographical place (much like "heaven" is seen to be above the clouds). We are urging a growth for all of us to understand the "kingdom" as broader than that. It is here and now, within us, around us, and yet to be.

Wondering Questions

"Wondering Questions" are open ended discussion questions. Parents/Guardians, try as hard as possible to NOT answer these questions for your child(ren).

Wondering Questions for Children (written by Rev. Brenda Stobbe)

- 1. I wonder if the children were afraid of the disciples?
- 2. I wonder how Jesus' voice sounded when he was angry?
- 3. I wonder how it felt to be held in Jesus' arms?

Wondering Questions for Older Children (written by Rev. Brenda Stobbe)

- 1. The disciples didn't want the children to "bother" Jesus. Share a time when you felt like "a bother" to someone. Who was it and what was going on?
- 2. Jesus told the adults gathered there that unless they become like a child, they couldn't enter the kingdom of heaven. What characteristics do you think you have that adults don't have?
- 3. Think about yourself. What are the things about yourself that you really like? How can you be sure you'll still have those things when you are an adult?

Daily Activities

All Ages

Please find the attached puzzles, activities, and coloring pages. These can be used by all students participating in today's lesson.

All Ages – Heart Art

What you need: construction paper, marker, tissue paper (optional – construction paper would work here too), scissors, and glue.

SAY: In today's Bible story, Jesus told the disciples to let the children come to Him. Jesus loves and cares for all children in the world! Let's make a piece of art today, and hang in our house as a reminder of Jesus' love for each one of us!

- On a piece of construction paper have your child(ren) draw the outline of a heart parents/guardians help as needed.
- Have your child(ren) glue either pieces of tissue paper (ripped or cut into specific shapes) or cut out shapes of different colored construction paper on the outline of the heart.
- Using the marker, have your child(ren) write either "Jesus Loves Me" or "Jesus Loves _____ (insert name here)" on the inside of the heart.
- Hang this piece of art somewhere in your house to help them always remember that Jesus loves ALL of his children!

Preschool - Red Light, Green Light

What you need: no supplies necessary

SAY: In our Bible story today, Jesus told the disciples to let the children come to Him. Jesus loves all children! Let's play a fun version of "Red Light, Green Light" together today. When I say "Come" you will move forward (like green light) but when I say "Stop!" you have to freeze (like red light).

- Keep playing until all family members reach you (the caller of Come/Stop!)
- You can repeat this game as many times as you would like.
- Once you finish the game, go back through the wondering questions for today's story.

SAY: Always remember that Jesus loves you and Jesus loves ALL of his children!

Elementary – Jesus Loves Me (Sign Language)

Diving Deeper – 3rd-5th graders – Comparing Scripture

What you need: Your Deep Blue Kids Bible

SAY: We are going to compare two scripture lessons today. They both represent the story of "Let the Children Come to Me," but can you determine how they are similar and how they are different?

- Mark 10:13-16
- Matthew 19:13-15

Once you finish reading the scripture lessons, go through the **God's Thoughts / My Thought's** on page 1123 titled "Bless You." Go through the following questions:

- When have you felt like a grown-up really wanted to hear what you had to say?
- How do you come to Jesus?
