In 18th Century England, "the People Called Methodists," began a movement with the conviction that one's faith should change the way that people lived their life. John Wesley, Methodism's founder, said we are to be a people who pursue a "holiness of heart and life." By the end of the century, the movement had reached the French fur trading post called St. Louis. These Methodists met secretly in homes because Catholicism was the official religion of the French owned territory west of the Mississippi River. Following the Louisiana Purchase, John Ball, for who the town of Ballwin is named, provided the first permanent place of worship for area Methodists in 1826- a congregation that later became Manchester United Methodist Church.

A lot has changed at Manchester UMC over the past 200+ years. A lot has even changed in the last 12 months! But what I hope has not changed is a passion to pursue a "holiness of heart and life." We still desire a faith that influences the way we live our lives. We still seek to make disciples of Jesus Christ who love God and love neighbor.

Acts of Worship: Finding Faith and Family Through Worship Arts

For Esnath "Essie" Mugambiwa, worship is more than just a Sunday morning experience—it's a way of life. As a participant in Modern Worship and the mother of two children, Zoey and Eli, who sing in Cantate, worship arts has become a deeply personal and meaningful part of her family's journey of faith.



"Being part of the worship arts program is how we connect God's word to our daily lives," Essie shares. "Music has a way of reinforcing Scripture. The repetition of verses and choruses helps them stick with us long after the service ends."

But beyond the spiritual connection, worship arts has also provided a way for Essie to stay close to her children. "Selfishly, it's a way to stay connected with Zoey and Eli," she admits with a smile. "We get to sing together not just in church but also in the car and at home. Worship isn't just something we do—it's part of who we are."

For Essie, music is more than just a backdrop to worship; it's how she engages with the message of the sermon and the presence of God. "Music fills my soul," she explains. "There's something powerful about expressing God's word through song and dance. It allows me to connect with my faith in a way that words alone sometimes cannot. I feel truly blessed to be part of a ministry that understands and encourages this connection."

The impact of worship arts extends beyond Sunday mornings. Essie often says, "All because of Modern Worship," as a testament to the unexpected blessings that have come through her involvement in this ministry. "My children have made friendships that stretch beyond the walls of the church, and I've found a family I never expected," she reflects. "The love and support we've received have shaped our lives in ways I never could have imagined. We wouldn't be where we are today if we hadn't said yes to serving in worship arts."

Through song, dance, and community, Essie and her family have found more than just a place to worship—they've found a home. Worship, after all, is more than just an act; it is the heartbeat of faith, bringing people together in love, connection, and the presence of God.

Devotion



Acts of devotion are personal ways we seek to love God more. They often take the form of spiritual disciplines like regular prayer, fasting, learning, reading devotions, studying the scriptures, spiritual development, and taking care of our bodies.

Acts of devotion are the personal ways we seek to love God more deeply. They take shape in spiritual disciplines like prayer, fasting, scripture study, reading devotions, and even caring for our bodies. But sometimes, devotion is found in unexpected places like a youth group game of 9 Square.

When I started working with the youth group I was merely fulfilling a need to have enough adults present to allow the activities to happen safely. I was concerned that I wasn't Biblically knowledgeable enough to serve in this role but was promised this would not be a problem as all curriculum was prepared and provided to me by Beth.

In the beginning, I filled a few spots on a Sunday morning or Wednesday evening but it wasn't until spending a week with the youth at Spirit Camp that I fully embraced the fact that this was the place for me to best use my spiritual gifts.

The youth at MUMC are the best. Yes, we learn a lot about following Jesus and the Bible during our time together but just as importantly the kids want to have those relationships with loving, trusted and fun adults. I love playing 9 square and all the other games with the kids. Some of them just want to tell me about their week or things going on with their friends. Sometimes, it's just making a bracelet or coloring together. The more time I spend with them the more they open up. While the majority of the time we are just laughing and having fun, there are times when they have confided in me with struggles and really needed to talk to an adult they trusted for advice.

I'm not sure there is a more fulfilling experience than knowing that I was there and was trusted when needed. These kiddos have so much more to deal with than I did growing up with today's social media. They really need the safe and incredibly fun space that the Youth Group provides them.

So while I may be learning some of the curriculum along side them, I am there for the fun and love and support and all the hugs they give me. They definitely brighten my day when I get to spend time with them.



Justice

Acts of Justice are the public way we love our neighbor. An example might be Jesus telling us to feed the hungry. But justice goes beyond feeding those who are hungry. Doing justice is asking why people are hungry and then to organize and act to address the causes of our neighbor's hunger







Acts of Justice: Works of Mercy through Sneakers by Moe Parisien

Being part of Mercy and Justice has always been who I am—as natural as waking up to greet the dawn of a new day. My journey deepened with Sneakers with Soul, a ministry born from a shared desire at MUMC to go beyond a 'one-and-done' event. Together with likeminded people who have a heart for mission, we sought to create a program with lasting impact—one that would serve our neighbors in need, particularly children experiencing poverty.

Scripture calls us to this work:

"...the poor, you will always have with you in the land. Therefore, Jesus commands you, 'You shall open wide your hand to your brother, to the needy and the poor, in your land." (Deuteronomy 15:7-11)

Mercy meets immediate needs—food, clothing, shelter—but justice challenges us to ask the harder question: Why do these needs exist in the first place? For me, the answer comes back to education. Without access to quality education, opportunities remain out of reach, and cycles of poverty persist. Justice is about breaking down the barriers that prevent people from thriving. Everyone deserves more than just getting by; they deserve the chance to succeed and flourish.

Sneakers with Soul is a mercy ministry addressing one symptom of poverty, but mercy must go hand in hand with justice. It's like the Upstream Parable—if we only focus on pulling people out of the river, we'll never ask: Who or what is pushing them in? Justice work means going upstream—identifying root causes, advocating for change, and ensuring sustainable solutions.

Mercy and justice are strongest when they work together. Mercy provides relief; justice creates transformation. As followers of Christ, we are called to love our neighbor by both meeting their needs and working for a world where all people—regardless of race, background, or economic status—have the opportunity for a better tomorrow. A tomorrow filled with hope, dignity, and lasting change.

Compassion

Acts of compassion are personal works of mercy. They are what you do when a neighbor is in need. If someone is hungry, you share your food. When someone is lonely, you give them a visit. When someone's loved one dies, you go and comfort them. When someone is a stranger in the congregation or your home you extend hospitality.





A Testimony of Compassion: Cliff Hackman's Story



At Manchester UMC, compassion isn't just a value—it's a way of life. For Cliff Hackman, this commitment to helping others is one of the most meaningful aspects of the church's mission. "Compassion is a key component of MUMC's teachings," he shares. "It encourages people to help those in need, offer comfort, and show kindness to others. MUMC provides us with the opportunity to do just that through its many ministries and outreach programs."

Beyond meeting needs, acts of compassion create deeper connections with others and nurture inner peace. "Compassion invites us to step into others' experiences with understanding and empathy," Cliff reflects. "In the context of faith, it has been transformative for me, giving me a profound sense of purpose. Simply caring for others fills my soul, offering fulfillment and peace that transcends my own personal needs or struggles."

Witnessing the compassion of others at MUMC has been a powerful source of inspiration. "Seeing people serve through ministry and outreach is a call to action," he explains. One example that has deeply impacted him is his involvement with Bridge Bread Bakery, a nonprofit social enterprise that helps people experiencing homelessness find stability and build a brighter future.

"Something as simple as picking up, selling, or promoting Bridge Bread products each weekend at church is incredibly rewarding," Cliff says. "Knowing that each loaf sold helps someone get off the streets and take steps toward a better life is both gratifying and humbling."

For Cliff, acts of compassion are more than just good deeds—they are an expression of faith, love, and community. Through service, he has found a deeper connection to God, his church, and the people who need it most.


As we reflect on this progress, we also look ahead with anticipation. Your continued support in 2025 is vital to the life of our church.

Thank you for being a part of this journey. Together, we are building a stronger foundation for the future.




Revenue \$2,713,192





ATTENDANCE






AVERAGE WEEKEND WORSHIP ATTENDANCE

ENDOWMENT REPORT BY RICHARD LUZE

In 1991, MUMC received a modest gift from a donor who then asked that it be used to create a permanent endowment fund at the church. Each year the church was to make disbursements from the earnings of the endowment to support church priorities. Historically, those annual disbursement rates have been between \$3.5%--\$5.0%.

Since that first gift, nearly \$2,500,000 has been added to the MUMC endowment by current and former members. During that same 33-year period over \$1,000,000 has been disbursed from the earnings of the endowment to support various ministries of the church.

In 2024, the total value of MUMC's endowment grew to over \$3,000,000, and nearly \$100,000 was disbursed to help underwrite the cost of maintaining the church's properties and supporting its many ministries. Currently, the Endowment Committee is exploring ways to dramatically grow the endowment to ensure that MUMC will remain in a strong financial position to, "Make a difference for Christ in church and community" for generations to come. The congregation will be learning more about these plans in the coming months.


